- Surrounding Circumstances:
 - The church fell prey to false teaching concerning the Second Coming. Many had quit their jobs and were waiting for the Rapture. Paul wrote this second letter to correct this error and urge them to settle down and get back to work.



 - The Thessalonians: will be counted worthy of the Kingdom of God

• Interesting Facts:

- 2 Thessalonians is Paul's shortest epistle to a congregation. NOTE: Philemon is shorter, but it is addressed to an individual.
- In 2 Thessalonians, Paul also deals with the subject of withdrawing fellowship from the disorderly. (3:6-15)

- What is my take away?
 - As with all of the Christian life, balance is key. We should always look forward to Jesus' return, but we should also be busy doing good while we're here on earth. Jesus said "I must work the works of Him who sent Me as long as it is day; night is coming when no one can work." (John 9:4)
